Introduction

In March, 1999, the International Congress of Distinguished Awards (ICDA) issued its first annual "Official Roster of Distinguished Awards. The Roster was accompanied by a number of data tables classifying more than 116 award programs according to the age of their creation, the US dollar cash value of their prizes, the field of their award giving, and the nation where they were located. Those award programs presented a total of 186 prizes, most with cash awards of \$100,000 or more in US dollar equivalents.

These awards represented the cream of the crop of more than 29,000 known awards, honors, and prizes as compiled and listed in a reference work with the fullest listing of awards world-wide published by Gale Research..

ICDA acknowledged in this first report the probable omission of worthy award programs—unknown to it, with large numbers of awards, or of the nature of fellowships or competitions—that would not fit into the type of data base then being produced. ICDA invited comment and suggestions on notable missing awards, how to recognize fellowships and competitions, and on how the Roster and related reports could be made useful to those both inside and outside of the world of award giving.

The 1999 "Official Roster of Distinguished Awards" was greeted with fanfare, with articles in a number of national newspapers and in such publications as The Scientist, giving critical acclaim to the listing and spreading the word about it.

And so also was the Official Roster II for 2000. Our second report began to include overlooked award programs, those with vast numbers of awards, fellowship programs, and certain musical competitions. We were pleased to find additional great awards that had not come to our attention. And we found a better and more compact way of reporting about the world's great award programs.

We not only got notice in the newsprint in the US; we began to get more inquiries from the media, awards, and other interested onlookers across Europe, Asia, Australia, and especially Japan—one of the nations where award giving has become a major practice. And another special reward was that we were contacted by BBC's award-winning documentary series "Arena," which

is now producing a documentary on the "world of awards" and making much use of the knowledge, information, and good judgment represented in our "Official Roster of Distinguished Awards."

The Official Roster of Distinguished Awards III, 2001

The 2001 Official Roster of Distinguished Awards is a major and telling advance over our previous rosters. Again, we have received extensive feedback from awards directors and interested parties all over the world. We have also discovered that it is no longer possible to investigate the world's greatest awards merely from print or print reference sources. We are definitely in the age of the internet and it is now possible to study many of the world's most distinguished awards on the internet.

The 2001 Roster contains a total of 122 award programs presenting a total of 763 individual awards and prizes either on an annual or biennial—and somewhat rarely a triennial or quadrennial--basis. That is a vast increase over the number of individual awards from our 1999 report because we are now including some programs not listed in our first report that present many awards each year. Among these are the following with their per annum number of awards:

These new entries alone account for 515 of the total of 763 awards presented mainly annually by the 122 listed award programs. However, we determined that these programs recognize excellence of a unique and generally international importance that should not be excluded from our Roster. But we have also determined that in future planned listings of the recipients of awards on the Roster, we will only list those individuals from these programs who have received other individual awards for distinction (see information on Directory of Distinguished Awards below).

ICDA's Official Roster is thus an ever developing, more correctly refined, and accurately precise barometer of what it takes to be an internationally distinguished award. Listed on the webpage of ICDA at www.icda.org, we eagerly invite suggestions of awards that should be on the Roster or which have expired or which do not meet the qualifications listed on our webpage or in our printed materials.

Amounts Awarded and Aggregate Costs of Awarding Distinguished Awards

If the amount of money issued by the 122 distinguished award programs on an annual basis be summed, the total cash outlay per annum in the year 2000 (expressed in US dollars) was \$65,990,200.

Since there were 763 individual awards, the average award given was \$86,500. This is a quite amazing sum, since some of the awards determined by ICDA to be distinguished include small or no cash prizes at all.

One might conclude that \$65 million is a relatively small sum in the contemporary world of finance. And indeed it is also a relatively small sum in the world of the awards. We have determined on the basis of the number of awards given universally that we know about, multiplied by the cost of administration, the world of awards is a \$2 billion cottage industry—at least.

Since the giving of distinguished awards is so different from giving grants and is so much more labor intensive and costly to administer, one could easily conclude that the giving of \$65 million in awards costs another \$35 million for a total of \$100 million as the costs of distinguished awards or one twentieth of the world-wide awards industry.

Relative Age of Distinguished Awards

As noted in our 1999 Roster report, the creation of awards—especially those with large cash prizes—is a relatively recent phenomenon. And the pace in the creation of new large price awards is only accelerating.

It is not suggested that the rate of creation of awards diminished in the 1990s. Rather the time between creation and public knowledge of the new award is often slightly delayed. But it is clear that more than 50% of all major awards have been created since 1981.

Awards by Country

The predominance of the United States, Japan, and Sweden in the realm of the number of awards and the amount of cash prizes given still continues. The relative rank of nations in the giving of awards listed on our Roster is as follows:

The apparent predominance of the United States is due, in part, of course, to the fact that so many fellowship awards are presented in that nation both to honor achievement and to encourage additional accomplishment. We have not found more than a few comparable award programs in other nations and would be eager to learn of any that exist with the paramount and international importance of those we have included in our 2001 Roster. We know of the Reuter Foundation Fellowships in the UK. But other programs comparable to the distinguished Rome Prizes and the Guggenheim Fellowships in the US have not yet been identified.

Awards by Field

In producing our Roster we have tried to fit a large number and variety of awards into some rather large categories of fields of accomplishment. Some have thought that we have thereby excluded the recognition of unique subcategories of realms of achievement. In this report, we have thus included a few new categories such as engineering and exploration as a tentative remedy to define valid topical fields recognized by major awards.

The major fields are as follows:

The preponderance of the Arts and Science are thrown off in some measure by the large fellowship programs included in this report. But the removal of those programs would not alter the ranking of these basic fields. The Arts, Science, Humanitarianism, and Environment supersede all other fields.

US Dollar Value of Awards

Once again we have calculated the US dollar value of distinguished awards by using current exchange rates as of March 1, 2001, as posted in prominent news services on or near that date. In many cases, we have rounded award values to the nearest thousand dollar level.

As has been the case for many years, the Templeton Prize for Religion is the largest prize for individual achievement and the Nobel Prizes in Sweden and Norway and the Bank of Sweden Prize are in a near second place. But as can be seen in the tabulation below, the \$1 million prize level is becoming a distinguished prize award upper level benchmark. No longer is the \$1 million prize level an exclusive amount. Indeed, the prizes listed below will be joined in 2001 by a new Gates Prize for Global Health at the \$1 million level.

But, in addition to \$1 million becoming a new upper level plateau for awards, many new awards have emerged or old ones have expanded themselves to the \$500,000 level including the Balzan Prizes (4) at \$625,000 and Aga Khan, Crafoord, Draper, Families Count, Lemelson-MIT, and Waterman at \$500,000. And there are some new prizes being created that we have learned about and other existing prizes that are moving to this level. One new \$500,000 award shortly to appear is the Russ Prize of the National Academy of Engineering.

Whereas prizes at \$250,000 and above were relatively rare just five years ago, there are 28 prize programs presenting 90 awards and prize fellowships at the \$250,000 level and above. Whereas a \$100,000 prize was viewed as a substantial cash prize five years ago, there are now 74 separate award programs presenting prizes at that level on our 2001 Roster.

But money is not everything. Our Roster of Distinguished Awards still incorporates unique and historically important award programs with small and sometimes no cash prizes such as America's National Book Awards, Pulitzer Prizes, Carnegie Medals, and the National Medals of Science and Technology. And, of course, the distinguished Fields Medals for mathematics that served as a fascinating theme topic for the Academy Award winning movie "Good Will Hunting."

Conditions and Directions in the World of Awards

As already suggested, the number and size of important awards for human achievement are increasing worldwide.

Award giving has long been a way of life in the United States and in Sweden, and has become so most notably in Japan. My theory about the abundance of award giving in the United States has always been that Americans give awards because they do not have a king! But also because the nation had such good seasons of economic prosperity in the last half of the twentieth century.

With regard to Japan, apart from the historic roots of recognizing notable citizens built into Japanese culture, award giving on an international scale was a product of that nation's unprecedented prosperity in the 1980s. It has also surely resulted from the emergence of Japan as a major player among the nations and economies of the world.

The key to award giving in Sweden seems more directly tied to the historic precedent in notable awards established by Alfred Nobel in his 1896 will where he secretly provided for the creation of what are known universally as the Nobel Prizes. The Nobel Prizes, first presented in ceremonies in 1901, are celebrating their centenary in this year. So it is thus fitting that this Official Roster for 2001 should conclude by congratulating the Nobel Foundation and the Swedish and Norwegian academies that choose Nobel recipients on a century of setting the standards and encouraging other organizations that have chosen to give awards for outstanding human achievement.

ICDA's "Directory of the World's Distinguished Awards"

ICDA is currently gathering information and data for the preparation and publication of the first edition of a Directory of the World's Distinguished Awards. We are grateful to those award programs who have cooperated in this undertaking. To be published by Oryx Press at the

end of 2001 or in early 2002, this directory will be the first authoritative guide to the world's most distinguished awards. Geared to represent those award programs appearing on this 2001 Official Roster of Distinguished Awards and the recipients of these awards, we look forward to extending and expanding upon the usefulness of this annual roster awards.

We hope that individuals and organizations both in the world of awards and observers of this special world will contact us with questions and comments about these and our other undertakings at ICDA to serve all realms of the world of awards.
